## From the Executive Director

Dear Friend,

*It's been almost a year since I started as Executive Director – a year of big changes in the world around us and here at Callen-Lorde.*

*Same sex marriage is now legal in California (and recognized in New York)! I was fortunate to be able to attend a wedding of a longtime couple who have each been HIV-positive since the 80s. In the first days of their relationship, they were unsure if they would have much time together, let alone see the day they could legally marry. On some fronts, we have come a long way.*

*On the other hand, we recently learned that previously published numbers of people with HIV were significantly wrong – the epidemic is much worse than we thought. Presidential debates are highlighting problems with our healthcare system, which are worse than ever: 47 million people in the US are uninsured. And, LGBT people are more likely to be uninsured.*

*We still live in the reality that many of us don't have access to healthcare.*

*In the midst of that reality, Callen-Lorde is here. We're here for the 12,000 people we saw last year. We're here for people with toothaches, sore throats, high blood pressure. We're here for people facing depression. Our HOTT Program is here for the too-many teens living on the streets after being kicked out of their homes. We're here for people who need to be screened for anal cancer (see page 2). We're here for Laura Jacobs (see page 3). And soon, we'll be here for people who want to start a family (see page 3).*

## SURVEY SAYS: PATIENTS ARE SATISFIED

The satisfaction of a job well done is clearly rewarding. But when that job involves providing extraordinary LGBT health care, the rewards increase exponentially.

It starts with a basic presupposition: We treat all of our patients with sensitivity and respect. We understand how important it is for them to feel good about coming to 18th Street ... that they feel confident about our skills ... that they know they'll be treated with dignity.

To make sure that we are on track, Callen-Lorde periodically conducts patient satisfaction surveys and the results of the latest one were just compiled.

Data was collected over the last six months through a questionnaire, in which Callen-Lorde asked its patients to rate services on a five-point scale: Excellent, Very Good, Good, Fair, and Poor. The results were astounding—stellar even— with patient satisfaction improving 37% across every measured category, as compared to last year's results.

- Overall satisfaction improved 22%— but that rate skyrocketed to 92% among our patients of transgender experience!
- The HOTT Program received an "Excellent" rating from its patients
- Medical and GYN Services also received equally strong scores.

The most frequently identified area in need of improvement was no surprise: the phone system. As a result, a group of Callen-Lorde staff members formed a team to address the problem— and major improvements are on the way. This will make appointment scheduling, prescription refills and contacting a staff member easier for most patients.

of us know too little about: **anal cancer.**

First, let me clarify a common misconception: anal cancer is different from colorectal cancer. Colorectal cancer (*which I discussed in the last issue of the Check Up*) can happen in any part of the 5-6 foot long large intestine — from the appendix in the right lower abdomen to the rectum. Anal cancer occurs in a very specific and small area where the rectum ends and the anal canal begins, about two inches in from the anal opening.

Another very important difference is that almost everyone is at equal risk for colon cancer. Behaviors like what you eat or how much you exercise can have a small influence on your colon cancer risk, but not much.

Anal cancer, on the other hand, is really a sexually transmitted disease. Anyone who has anal sex is at much higher risk than someone who does not have anal sex. Therefore, as a group, men who have sex with men are

# UPDATE: Anal Cancer Screening and Prevention

**This column gives me the opportunity to discuss some of the many unique health challenges that our communities face.**

Today I would like to discuss one that too many

considered at higher risk. Moreover, HIV-positive gay men are two-to-three times as likely to develop anal cancer than HIV-negative gay men.

While the exact causes of anal cancer — as with all cancers — remain a mystery, there is a large amount of evidence that human papillomavirus (HPV) infection is at the root of this disease. HPV is a group of viruses that mostly cause warts, but can also cause cancer, depending on which strains are causing the infection. How common is HPV infection in men who have sex with men? According to **Dr. Stephen Goldstone** at Gay Health ([www.gayhealth.com](http://www.gayhealth.com)), *"Approximately 95% of gay men with HIV and 65% of gay men without HIV have HPV in their anal canals or the surrounding skin."*

The virus can be transmitted by casual contact, which is how warts mostly wind up on our hands, feet and face. However, it is also very commonly transmitted by sexual contact and can lead to cancer on some inner surfaces of the body, like the cervix, under the foreskin, and in the anal canal. HPV infection is the main cause of cervical cancer and the reason why sexually active women and transgender men should have annual cervical Pap smears.

In fact, anal cancer and cervical cancer are

very similar diseases, with some very important differences. They're both caused by the same high-risk strains of HPV. They're both transmitted by sexual contact. The risk for both is reduced, but not entirely eliminated, by using condoms. And they're both more common and more aggressive in people who are infected with HIV. They are so similar that the estimated rates of anal cancer in gay men today are about the same as the rates for cervical cancer in women 65 years ago, before screening with Pap smears revolutionized cancer prevention and saved thousands of lives.

The biggest difference between anal and cervical cancer is in public awareness and understanding of screening. Most young adolescent girls know that they need to get a cervical Pap smear annually after they become sexually active. However, most gay men and other people who have anal sex have no idea that they might be at higher risk for anal cancer, and no idea that there are options for screening and prevention.

But if cervical cancer is our model, there is reason to hope. Routine cervical Pap smears have decreased the incidence of cervical cancer from 40 to 50 per 100,000 to approximately eight per 100,000. It is likely that the same type

of screening and prevention efforts can have a similar effect on the rates of anal cancer in gay men and people with HIV.

Some consider anal cancer screening and prevention controversial. The skeptics correctly point out that there is little evidence to show that anal Pap smears decrease the rates of anal cancer or save lives. Gathering such evidence would take decades and cost millions. But to be fair, there was never much evidence that cervical Pap smears were effective until many years had gone by and the dropping rates of cervical cancer in communities where Pap smears were used could be easily measured.

This is why Callen-Lorde is extremely proactive in advising our patients of anal cancer risks. As in so many ways, we have been on the cutting-edge of prevention, offering screenings to our HIV patients since 2004, long before they became the accepted protocol. (The AIDS Institute of New York State started recommending anal cancer screening and prevention for people with HIV in 2007.)

While we believe it is probably prudent for all gay and bisexual men to get an anal Pap smear to determine if they have abnormal cells, we are focusing our current efforts on

our HIV patients, since they are at highest risk. HIV-positive patients who need anal cancer screening should get anal Pap smears every year. HIV-negative patients probably only need an anal Pap smear every two to three years.

Getting a Pap smear is simple and only minimally uncomfortable. A provider passes a swab into the rectum to collect cells that will later be examined under a microscope. If abnormal cells are seen, the patient returns for a more extensive examination of the anal canal using a microscope — called High-Resolution Anoscopy (HRA). Although it sounds intimidating, the procedure is actually very simple, very low-risk, and very easy. It requires no sedation or general anesthesia and takes about 15 minutes. Most patients go right back to work the same day.

If precancerous tissue is discovered during the HRA, we offer infrared treatment right at Callen-Lorde, which is non-invasive and involves mild and transient side effects.

At Callen-Lorde we know that to avert pointless suffering, we must give our patients all the facts about this disease and how screening can lead to prevention or early detection — a major factor in beating all types of cancer. ▲

## UPGRADING OUR PHONE SYSTEM

Providing our community with access to quality care is a distinguishing hallmark at Callen-Lorde, yet in our day-to-day operations we realize that our phone system is not exactly user friendly.

In fact, the system is the top patient complaint we receive. To make patients feel less frustrated, we gathered a team of seven Callen-Lorde staff members to solve the problems of our antiquated phone system. The team met weekly for a number of months and identified problem areas – and developed solutions.

### Pilot-tested, the new system is about to be inaugurated!

The biggest — *and most* welcome — change is the introduction of a call center where a live staff person will answer all incoming calls during our hours of operation. A new voicemail menu will be available during closed hours, which is patient-centered and easy to follow.

We expect the call center and the new voicemail menu to be implemented in the middle of September 2008.
